

Immigration Lawyer Selection Checklist

1. Define Your Legal Issue

6. Understand Fee Structure

- Fee Types: Clarify whether they charge hourly rates, flat fees, or contingency fees.
- Cost Estimates: Request a detailed estimate of all potential costs and fees involved.
- Payment Plans: Inquire about available payment plans or financing options if needed.

7. Review Representation Agreement

- Written Agreement: Ensure there is a formal, written representation agreement outlining the scope of services.
- Terms and Conditions: Carefully read and understand all terms, including termination clauses and refund policies.
- Transparency: Make sure all fees, services, and expectations are clearly documented.

8. Check Success Rate



- Past Outcomes: Ask about their success rate in handling cases similar to yours.
- Realistic Expectations: Ensure they provide honest assessments without guaranteeing specific outcomes.
- Client References: Request references from past clients to verify their success claims.

9. Availability

- Time Commitment: Confirm that the lawyer has the time and resources to dedicate to your case.
- Case Load: Inquire about their current caseload to ensure they can prioritize your case effectively.
- Backup Support: Check if there is support staff or associates available to assist when the primary lawyer is unavailable.

10. Personal Compatibility

- Comfort Level: Ensure you feel comfortable and confident working with the lawyer.
- Trustworthiness: Assess their integrity and willingness to act in your best interests.
- Cultural Sensitivity: Confirm that they understand and respect your cultural background and specific needs.

11. Referrals and References

- Personal Recommendations: Seek referrals from friends, family, or colleagues who have used immigration lawyers in New Zealand.
- Professional Networks: Ask other professionals, such as accountants or real estate agents, for recommendations.
- Reference Checks: Contact provided references to inquire about their experiences and satisfaction.



12. Location

- Proximity: Choose a lawyer whose office location is convenient for in-person meetings, if necessary.
- Multiple Locations: Consider firms that operate in multiple regions of New Zealand if your case requires it.
- Virtual Services: Ensure they offer virtual consultations and services if physical proximity is an issue.

13. Persuasion and Advocacy Skills

- Advocacy: Evaluate their ability to effectively advocate on your behalf during hearings or negotiations.
- Negotiation Skills: Assess their proficiency in negotiating favorable terms and outcomes.
